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Cantwell cheers inclusion of local journalism support in Build Back Better package

Thursday, U.S. Senator Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.) spoke on the Senate floor to urge her Senate colleagues to support the local journalism provisions in the Build Back Better reconciliation package. Several provisions of the Local Journalism Sustainability Act authored by Senator Cantwell were included in the draft text of the Build Back Better reconciliation package. This legislation would help financially support local newspapers, broadcasters and online media through tax credits to incentivize hiring and retaining journalists.

"Journalistic standards, local newspapers and broadcasters play a critical role in holding our elected officials accountable, shining a spotlight on important news and challenging the issues of our community to come to light," Senator Cantwell said. "The Local Journalism Sustainability Act is essential to maintaining that trust, that diversity of voices and that local perspective. The tax incentives in this bill will help local newspapers and digital-only news journalists, and broadcast newsrooms remain financially viable to retain and hire local base journalists to cover local news stories."

Kay Smith-Yount grew up in 1930s Mississippi picking cotton with her family and listening to her grandmother's stories about slavery. At a young age, she saw men in white robes and pointed hats ride to her house looking for her uncle.

Church was one of the few places she felt safe.

Her first memories of reading the newspaper are not from the Northeast Mississippi Daily, the region's largest paper. Although she remembers there were rarely mentions of Black people, unless they committed a crime.

Why the Local Journalism Sustainability Act is so bipartisan



The Local Journalism Sustainability Act has strong bipartisan support — because the crisis in local news affects all Americans, regardless of party. The collapse of community journalism leads to more corruption, waste, polarization and misinformation.

Of the 90 most recent publications to shutter as a result of the coronavirus pandemic, 60 percent were in counties that voted for Trump in 2020. More broadly, when comparing University of North Carolina's news desert data to the 2020 electoral map, 85 percent of news deserts are in counties that went for Trump in the last election. (Doesn't include Alaska.)

What's more, some of the problems that arise when community journalism withers are often of the sort that conservatives care about — especially wasteful and ineffective government. Analysis and reporting have shown that local corruption increases as local news declines, as do local taxes.
